Promoting British Values at

Wellesley Primary School



The DfE have reinforced the need "to create and enforce a clear and rigorous expectation on all schools to promote the fundamental British Values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs."

At Wellesley we uphold and teach pupils about British values which are defined as:

- democracy
- the rule of law
- individual liberty
- mutual respect for and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs and for those without faith.

These values are taught though Personal, Social, Health and Emotional (PSHE) and Religious Education (R.E). We also teach British Values through delivering a range of whole school and key stage assemblies and through teaching a broad and balanced curriculum.

The Values are reinforced through the school in the following ways:

Mutual Respect: Language of respect, school values, supporting each other, reinforced through our behaviour policy, home-school agreement, displays and school ethos.

SMSC: Curriculum, assemblies, visitors to school, school visits.

Celebrating national events: Wellesley day; Queen's birthday; Jubilee and Tim Peake. Individual Liberty:
Freedom to make choices,
clear behaviour policy,
choice of learning
challenges, growth
mindset, empowering
children to take risks.

Democracy: School council, Eco leaders, Class rules, Children's learning pledge, sports leaders, lunchtime buddies.
